





ANOTHER WAY WE GIVE BACK Jump River Electric Cooperative, Inc. **Capital Credits Returned to Members**

Tump River Electric Cooperative is more than your power Jump River Electric Cooperative is more unan your power provider. We are your cooperative, which means our focus is always on you, our members. One of the ways we show this is through the retirement of capital credits.

The board of directors recently authorized the return of over \$366,843 in capital credits to our members. Active members will receive their portion of this retirement as a credit on the energy bill mailed in November. With this latest distribution, our year-todate total for capital credit payouts has surpassed \$500,000.

2025 Retirement and Earnings Timeline

This year's retirement returns 100 percent of the remaining capital credits earned in 1995, 50 percent of those earned in 1996, and 1.5 percent of credits earned between 1997 to 2024.

What are capital credits?

JREC is a not-for-profit cooperative and as you pay your monthly energy bill, your dollars are put to work powering, improving, and maintaining a safe and reliable electric system. At year-end, JREC distributes any margins (profits) to members as capital credits. These credits

CLEARING THE PATH TO RELIABILITY

eeping power lines clear of overgrown vegetation Kimproves service reliability and, most importantly, safety for you, our employees, and the infrastructure of our system. Any tree or branch that falls across a power line creates a potentially dangerous situation. Serve Up Energy Savings

The Department of Energy offers these tips to help gobble up savings along with your turkey this Thanksgiving.

- **Turkey Talk** Don't buy a turkey that's bigger than you need. A smaller turkey takes less time to cook, saving on your energy bill. No need to preheat the oven when slow roasting a turkey for several hours and lower your thermostat a few degrees and let the oven help heat your home.
- Overdone Appliances Many side dishes can be prepared in smaller kitchen appliances, like slow cookers and toaster ovens, which use less energy.
- **Dish Up Savings** Take advantage of your dishwasher. An Energy Star certified dishwasher uses less than half as much energy as washing dishes by hand and uses less water. You can also save energy by washing only full loads and letting your dishes air-dry.



arty Hanson, a JREC member for over 30 years, is a master decoy carver that has been honing his 'craft' since his first carving at eleven years old! His lifelong dedication and passion for this craft are seen in every piece he creates. What may have started as a hobby has transformed into a craft, creating a legacy of woodcarving and artistry.

Childhood Curiosity

His father, a teacher and avid duck hunter, introduced Marty to the sport on Nelson Lake. As a child, Marty spent many fall hunting seasons at his grandfather Algot's house in Hayward. It was there that he discovered a collection of duck decoys in the basement, and he fondly recalls being able to play with them during his visits. In 1976, he carved his first bird, marking the start of a lifelong journey.

At just 14 years old, Marty had his first job carving duck decoys for a Minneapolis Gun Club member, making around 10-20 birds a week for \$25-35 apiece. "These decoys were nothing special," claims Marty. They were simple, functional decoys, but by the mid-1980s he began refining his craft, creating more detailed "fancy" birds for

Wild Wings art gallery in Edina, Minnesota, which helped supplement his income.

Carving His Own Way

Largely self-taught, Marty has refined his skills with each decoy made over the past 50 years. To truly keep this art or craft as it should be, he utilizes hand tools that are 100 to 200 years old, reserving the use of power tools to a band saw and a drill.

When asked to share his story, he states that he didn't have a lot of exposure to the outside that influenced him as a carver. He began well before social media and the internet, with very few books on this topic. His first twenty years were spent on creating more functional duck decoys and fine-tuning his Midwest style, which translates to a decoy with a flat bottom, keels, and a broad beam, ensuring it floats well in larger local waters.

His work has evolved from solid to hollow decoys, making them lighter, more functional, and longer lasting. For the past 15 years, only about 20 percent of his time has been spent making functional decoys; the rest is devoted to more artistic or collectible pieces. With every piece being handmade, no two are alike.

Beyond the Workshop

Marty has served on three national vintage and collectible decoy boards for the past 35 years. He is also a collector and dealer of old decoys and continues to seek antique decoys and related items to purchase. In the early years, Marty participated in a lot of decoy shows from coast to coast, which promoted his craft and business, and brought everyone together, including collectors. "The internet changed it all. People quit going to the shows and it was just easier to do stuff online. A lot of things are now sold at auctions or online," said Marty. The change in how business is done now allows Marty to spend more time in his workshop, nestled in the beautiful backwoods of Hayward, and less time on the road.

A Renowned Craftsman

Marty's unique pieces can be found across the country, with some pieces owned by former presidents, entertainers, NASCAR drivers, and others. His reputation and sales are primarily built on word of mouth and the demand for his unique pieces. He also helps support organizations like the Sawyer County Back the Blue Foundation by donating his work.

Who is Marty Hanson?

Marty humbly describes himself as "a decoy maker first." But those who know his work call him one of the best contemporary carvers alive. He is the only decoy carver to have his decoys appear on a Ducks Unlimited magazine cover, and he has done that twice. He's earned numerous awards, had a successful business that was later sold, and continues to have a thriving business, proven by the long list of orders waiting to be filled.

To Marty, the artistry comes second to the integrity of his craft. He continues to fine-tune this craft with each piece made, maintaining the way it was done centuries ago. He feels this is what is being lost within this craft. There is no threat from AI for Marty. "AI cannot figure this out," he says, "because everything is different and it comes from me. There is no algorithm."

More Than Ducks

Marty's creativity extends well beyond duck decoys. He has carved a variety of pieces, including fish, swans, a walking goose, shoreline birds, a flamingo, several eagles, and even duck calls. Some are made for practical purposes, like hunting, others are purely artistic and enjoyed by collectors—but all reflect his commitment to this craft and his creativity. The outdoors can be a source of inspiration, but he says that it primarily comes from what he still wants to make. Time spent on each project varies, but it typically takes him more than 20 hours to create a standard duck decoy.

Words of Advice

"Start young," Marty tells aspiring carvers. "Make what you want and what you like. Don't feel locked into any rules or dimensions." The artistry comes later, once you've refined what you can do and your skill level.

A Lasting Legacy

Marty has been able to turn a childhood passion into a career and a legacy of something he loves. It's taken him many years to build his product to a point where people really understand it and acknowledge it. Marty wants to preserve how carving was done hundreds of years ago, as decoys can last hundreds of years and leave something that is truly a legacy for generations to come.
