UNDERSTANDING YOUR PART IN THE POWER SYSTEM

e are always prepared to respond swiftly to outages and restore power safely, but it is also important for homeowners to understand which parts of the electric system are their responsibility and which are maintained by us at the co-op. Understanding this can help speed up repairs and ensure

The cooperative is responsible for maintaining and repairing the equipment and lines that run to your electric meter, and the homeowner is responsible for the equipment between the meter and the home or business. The graphic depicts co-op equipment in (gold) and member-owned equipment in (blue).


everyone stays safe when the

Any necessary repairs to the homeowner's equipment must be conducted before JREC can restore power. Members should hire a licensed electrician when making any repairs to member-owned equipment.

By working together to understand the essential equipment that powers daily life, we can all be better prepared to start the repair and restoration process if severe weather impacts our community.

INSPECT HEATING SYSTEM:

- Have your heating system professionally serviced.
- Replace air filters if needed.
- Ensure vents and radiators are unblocked for efficient heat distribution.

TEST AND MAINTAIN SMOKE AND **CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS:**

- Replace batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.
- Test detectors to ensure they function properly.

PREPARE PIPES AND WATER SUPPLY:

- Insulate exposed pipes to prevent freezing.
- Drain and shut off outdoor faucets and irrigation systems.
- Know the location of water shut-off valve in case of emergency.

PREPARE YOUR HOME'S EXTERIOR:

- Clear gutters and downspouts to prevent ice dams.
- Trim trees away from the house to avoid damage.
- Ensure downspouts extend away from the foundation.
- Service and store equipment such as lawnmowers and trimmers.
- Gather winter tools such as snow shovels and ice melt.

INCREASE HOME ENERGY EFFICIENCY:

- Seal gaps at windows and doors with weatherstripping or caulk.
- Set ceiling fans to rotate clockwise to circulate warm air.
- Lower your thermostat a few degrees to save on heating costs.





s the heating season quickly approaches, we want to remind everyone of the services available to **L**assist with winter heating and utility bills, should the need arise. You can find this information, along with other resources for housing expenses such as replacing a water heater or furnace, online at jrec.com/energyassistance.

Some assistance programs offer one-time payments during the heating season, which typically runs from October 1 to May 15. The amount of energy assistance received can vary based on several factors, including the household size, income, and energy costs. Additionally, crisis assistance may also be available if you have no heat, are nearly out of fuel, or if your electricity has been or will soon be shut off.

Members can also contact their local agency to determine eligibility. A list of both county and statewide agencies is provided below. If you are unable to keep your account balance current, it is important to contact us at 715-532-5524 to discuss your situation further.

We look forward to spending Halloween with you!


Celebrate Co-op Month By Giving

Evergreen is an opportunity for electric cooperative members to voluntarily contribute to the increased use of renewable energy sources. Private ownership of renewable energy does not work for everyone. A member's property may not support it, or the upfront costs and maintenance may be too great. Through this program, you have access to clean, local, renewable energy that best fits your lifestyle and budget.

To participate in the *Evergreen* program, members can purchase *Evergreen* blocks of 100 kilowatt-hours (kWh) of power. Each block is priced at 50 cents per block.
