Our 81st Annual Meeting saw a lot of information come to our membership.

The meeting was held April 27, with about 200 members in attendance. The message from your board of directors and management was a common one. We will work hard to make sure that you are getting important and timely information about what is happening at JREC and how it will impact you, our member-owner.

Long-Term Stabilization of Rates Members learned that long-term rate stabilization is the number-one goal of Jump River Electric Cooperative. More new technology is being applied to our electrical system to provide more cost-efficient power and reliability. JREC will not increase rates in 2019. Efficiencies and system modernization are helping avoid passing along an increase in Dairyland Power Cooperative wholesale rates to you.

LCO Easement Resolution The government shutdown did stall our momentum as the Bureau of Indian Affairs was not able to mediate our contract with the Lac Courte Oreilles (LCO). The good news is that the issues with the LCO are back on track to a mutually beneficial solution.

New Technology and Services New technology is now coming online to provide you with access to your account along with daily usage information, enabling members to better manage their own costs. The new billing software system allows for multiple billing cycles to better match the co-op's revenue stream to costs.

Our Community Cents program is getting ready to move forward. Soon you will have the opportunity to round up your power bill to help benefit our communities and members. The metering system upgrade is nearing completion, and we credit our aggressive right-of-way clearing for reliability topping 99 percent in 2018.

Power Cost Adjustment Restored The PCA has been restored, allowing the cooperative to pass on direct charges and credits from our power supplier. The PCA was used this past December to return your portion of excess margins to you instead of retaining them for 30 years as capital credits. I am happy to report that the co-op returned almost \$767,000 to our members last year between our capital credit retirement and excess margins.

Other Highlights President & CEO Barb Nick from Dairyland Power Cooperative, our generation and transmission provider, gave a very good look into the future of our power supply and the issues we are facing.

Linda Powers from River Valley Architects briefed the membership on the proposed plans to replace the Ladysmith headquarters—built in 1952—with a new, more energy-efficient, self-contained facility on the existing site. This facility would also host a community room. Members asked numerous questions of the directors and staff as well as our guest speakers after the presentations. I will be giving you more detailed information in my next message.

Voting Results You (our member-owners) approved a resolution to the Bylaws that will allow for electronic voting in the future; this will allow more member-owners to have voting access. Members rejected an advisory resolution urging sale or lease of the Hayward office with proceeds earmarked to minimize rate hikes. However, your cooperative is actively pursuing renting a portion of the office.

Myron Brooks and Walter Kruk were uncontested in their bids for re-election. One new director was elected as Lori Taguma was defeated by Jason Weaver in a close race. I would like to thank Lori for her service and wish her well.

The director reorganization meeting, held at the following board meeting, retained the lineup of officers: Carow continues as president; Kruk, vice president; and Joe Lorence, secretary-treasurer.

SAVE \$15 ON YOUR ENERGY BILL

There are a lot of great reasons to sign up for ACH (Automated Clearing House) and have your bill automatically withdrawn each month



from your checking or savings account. But in June and July, we're adding one more reason: a \$15 energy credit. That's right, we are paying you to pay us. This one-time credit will be applied to your next energy bill.

Signing up is easy. Go to www.jrec.com and click on the Pay Bill Online button, which will re-direct you to SmartHub. Remember, you will need your email address, new JREC account number, and banking information when you sign-up. This new account number will be listed on your June bill.

COLLECTION AND DISCONNECTION OF ENERGY ACCOUNTS

As we move to our new billing system, the process for handling past due accounts will change along with our billing cycle.

Effective June 1, 2019, our billing date will change to the first of the month and will be due on the 16th of the month. If the current bill is not paid on or before the 16th of the month, a 1.5 percent penalty will be added to the bill.

If the current month's bill is not paid by the first of next month, the next bill will show a past-due balance that is due immediately. If the previous balance is not paid by the due date of that new bill, a disconnection notice will be sent.

If electric service is disconnected for nonpayment, the past-due balance must be paid in addition to any current and unbilled electricity up to the date and time of disconnection. Additional charges are also applied including disconnection/reconnection fees as well as a delinquent deposit. All the past-due electricity, current and unbilled electricity, disconnection/reconnection fees, and the delinquent deposit must be paid prior to reconnection of service.

If you are unable to pay your past-due bill in full, please contact your Health and Human Services Office. The phone numbers for the offices in each county served by the cooperative are as follows: Chippewa 715-726-7840, Rusk 715-532-2299, Sawyer 715-634-4806, LCO Energy Assistance Program 715-634-8934, and Taylor 715-748-3332. For further assistance, please contact the Farm Center at 800-942-2474. We recommend you contact these agencies as soon as possible, as guaranteed arrangements must be made to stop a disconnection of electric service.

Because we are moving to a shorter collection cycle, past-due accounts receive a disconnection notice and will be subject to disconnection faster than in the past.

Options to make payments have also been expanded to include:

- You can use SmartHub, our new online payment service, for a one-time or automatic credit/debit card or electronic bank drafts. SmartHub can be accessed via the mobile app or at our website.
- You can pay in the office with cash, check, credit card, money orders, etc.
- You can place your payment in the drop box in front of each office.
- You can pay over the phone with a debit/credit card or by check. The toll-free number is 1-888-255-6489.
- You can also pay on our website with our Pay Now option without having to set up an online account.
